so that we can achieve our mission and continue to serve Egypt and Egyptians in the best possible manner.



Local Development



The Local Development Unit continued working towards improving the quality of life for poor and marginalized citizens, especially youth, women, children at risk, and persons with disabilities. By using a rights-based approach to development, the unit's work supports justice, equality, and human dignity by empowering the poor and marginalized. Efforts aim to assure equal access to resources and public services, as well as reaffirming the use of advocacy as an effective mechanism of change. Through establishing partnerships with civil society organizations, government institutions, and the private sector to mobilize community resources and support the rights of the poor, as well as institutional capacity building for partners.

Persons with disabilities benefited from improved economic, social, environmental, and health conditions, as well as social integration



Major Achievements

- Members of the Egyptian Forum for Persons with Disabilities and CEOSS employees were invited to participate in four parliament hearing sessions, for the first time, in order to discuss disability draft law. The Egyptian Forum for Persons with Disabilities is a national disability movement formed by CEOSS, which includes representatives of organizations that work with PWDs from 14 governorates. This was followed by a series of meetings to discuss advocacy strategies, for passing a law to protect persons with disabilities, which targeted Egyptian parliament members, media institutions, and civil society organizations in order to win their support to amend the draft law being discussed in parliament.
- Prepared and launched the Ministry of Social Affairs' strategy

- for protecting, empowering, and rehabilitating persons with disabilities in partnership with Ministry of Social Affairs representatives.
- Developed a system to integrate PWDs into touristic activities and services affiliated with the Ministry of Antiquities, through training 20 employees of museums and archeological areas in Minia about disabilities and community integration. The Malawi Museum has changed the way it offers services to PWDs by providing environmental adaptation to assist persons with motor disabilities, allowing persons with visual impairments to touch certain artifacts, and training specialists in sign language to assist persons with hearing impairments.
- Worked with the Student Union of

- Beni-Suef University to qualify 50 young PWDs for the job market.
- Provided access to an integrative environment for PWDs in youth centers.
- Organized celebrations for the International Day of PWDs and the White Cane Safety Day in the Minia, under the auspices of the Minia Governor with the participation public institutions and NGOs that work with PWDs, as well as the media. The celebration included parades for PWDs to increase community awareness related to the rights of PWDs and the importance of integrating them into the community. A celebration was conducted in the Governorate's administration building, exhibiting products for PWDs.

Major Achievements

- Renovated two public health institutions, in cooperation with the Ministry of Health, so that they are accessible and in compliance with the Egyptian code of buildings and roads.
- Collaborated with five private sector institutions to renovate seven religious, cultural, and service providing institutions to be accessible for PWDs, as well as to provide and repair mobility aids and prosthetic devices for low-income PWDs.
- Embraced transparency through organizing events, conferences, workshops, and meetings to discuss the state budget in partnership with the Ministry of Finance, civil society organizations, and research centers.
- Participated in two employment forums to provide equal opportunities for work for PWDs, in partnership with the Ministry of Youth and Sports and the International Labor Organization.
- Started trial operation at CEOSS' new industrial center located at Obour City. The center includes units for manufacturing prosthetic devices, mobility aids, and artificial limbs as well as a workshop for implementing architectural adaptation.

Major Achievements

- Formed 18 child protection committees in 18 schools in Beni-Suef and developed action plans for these committees to advocate for compliance with decree number 287, pertaining to school regulations.
- Opened 50 medical files for the families of child laborers in Qalyoubia in order to guarantee free medical examinations for all family members, as well as their right to safe healthcare by advocating for compliance with article 24 of the child law, pertaining to children's rights to healthcare.
- Signed a cooperation protocol the Directorate of Education, the Directorate of labor, the Directorate of Social Affairs, and the Directorate of Youth and Sports in Beni-Suef to help children access their rights.
- Conducted vocational training for child laborers to direct them away from hazardous professions and into safe ones, in partnership with the Ministry of Industry.
- Provided vocational training and employment for families of children at risk, and trained children in life skills, in partnership with NGOs working in the areas

- of child labor and economic empowerment.
- Formed a cohort of organizations working with children in Cairo and Giza in order to expand the solidarity network and impact of efforts to support the rights of children at risk,




Major Achievements

• Issued a document on the required amendments to the social health insurance draft law currently being discussed, and presented it to Members of Parliament in preparation presenting the law in Parliament, A series of meetings and discussions were held for citizens, civil society organization members, media representatives, Members of Parliament, the General Union for Non-Government Organizations and Institutions, and the Regional Union for Non-Government Organizations and Institutions in Cairo, Qalyoubia, Minia, and Beni-Suef.

- Provided assistance and resources for seven healthcare centers. These centers were provided with medical equipment and capacity building for their medical teams, in partnership with the Ministry of Health and Population in order to develop medical centers in poor villages and slums.
- Conducted comprehensive medical and eye care convoys

- in poor and marginalized areas with limited access to health care facilities, in partnership with the family planning and reproductive health sector of the Ministry of Health and Population.
- Signed an agreement with the Egyptian Institute for Fighting Breast Cancer in order to raise awareness about breast cancer and educate people about the early detection of tumors.





- Signed a cooperation protocol with the basic health care sector of the Ministry of Health and Population to include eye-care services in the basic package of services provided by public healthcare units.
- Provided medical examinations
- and early detection of eye diseases, corrected vision defects, and conducted surgical interventions for students from 25 schools, in partnership with the Ministry of Education and Vodafone Egypt Foundation for Community Development in Sohag.
 - Celebrated World Sight Day 2016 in partnership with Minia Directorate of Health and Population and numerous civil society organizations. The celebration included awareness raising sessions about eye health, blindness, and visual impairments.

Major Achievements

- Expanded the geographic working area to include Sohag through the "Knowledge is Power" program, in partnership with Vodafone Egypt Foundation for Community Development, to enhance education. This was achieved in 25 schools through the implementation of an integrated package of interventions providing effective models, educational practices, and eradicating illiteracy.
- Signed a cooperation protocol with the Ministry of Education to raise the efficiency of the educational process, and develop target schools.

- Signed cooperation protocols with the General Authority for Adult Education to eradicate illiteracy and the Ministry of Communications to implement training courses for teachers and students.
- Collaborated with a number of civil society organizations in education interventions. These include; World Food Program conducted maintenance in schools; Nahdet Misr established school libraries; New Generation Schools trained school principals and deputies in quality control measures; Heart to Heart Foundation conducted medical

examinations for students to detect cases of rheumatic fever; CEOSS affiliated Horus Hospital conducted eye examinations to detect eye diseases and correct vision through prescription eye-glasses and treating diseases; Egyptian Organization for Advancing Persons with Disabilities and Autism helped in developing the skills of school resource rooms; and Care International trained student unions.

Major Achievements

- Conducted 6 round table discussions which were attended by 95 representatives of partner organizations, civil society organizations, private sector companies, and government institutions. The discussions addressed unemployment and the role of community organizations in combatting this issue. These discussions resulted in the signing of six joint cooperation protocols
- to empower young people to have equal access to available resources at these entities including training, employment opportunities, and establishing small enterprises.
- Issued a position paper on unemployment signed by representatives of partners in Minia; including government institutions, civil society organizations, elected committees, and training centers.
- Organized an employment fair in Qalyoubia in cooperation with the Directorates of Manpower, Youth and Sports, Social Affairs, and 21 private sector companies. The private sector companies employed 230 individuals.
- Continued collaboration with the Fund for Slum Development to develop Hikr al-Sakakini district in Cairo.

Major Achievements

- Signed 15 cooperation protocols with the Directorates of Agriculture and Irrigation, and Water Resources in Minia, Beni-Suef, and Qalyoubia to support the rights of farmers to access resources and services provided by these entities.
- Signed 28 marketing contracts with the private sector so small farmers can sell their products in more profitable markets. Partnerships were established with companies that supply agricultural products via implementation of pilot fields to raise the awareness of small farmers of good agricultural practices and resources.
- Increased the income of small farmers by allowing them the opportunity to sell 9,269 tons of green beans in foreign markets, despite economic hardship in Egypt.

- Activated ministerial decree number 749 for the year 2009 pertaining to providing agricultural production requirements for farmers in Minia and Qalyoubia, as increasing the current fertilizer outlets.
- Formed a coordinating committee in Minia representing Directorate of Agricultural, agricultural cooperatives, elected committees, and the media in order to implement decrees and recommendations that guarantee small farmers' access to agricultural resources.
- Organized an international conference to exchange experiences between Egypt and Bosnia and Herzegovina with the participation of farmers organizations' representatives, the private sector, government institutions, and funding agencies

from both countries.

Activated ministerial decree number 659 for the year 2009 pertaining to organizing a conference in Beni-Suef to discuss issues facing female farmers in marketing their crops. Representatives of farmers' organizations, the general secretary of the Governor of Beni-Suef, and the National Council for Women attended the conference. Due to this conference, officials of the governorate conducted a field visit to the main market in the governorate to identify problems and violations female farmers were facing, and a plan was developed to monitor the markets more effectively.

- Conducted 35 hearing sessions with citizens and decision makers to allow citizens to address rights violations and hold decision makers accountable.
- Formed 4 new coalitions and networks that adopt developmental issues in the work areas.
- Innovated 32 internal financial regulations for NGOs and foundations in line with the rights-based approach and providing access of services and resources to citizens.




Percentages of disbursed loans

Forum for Intercultural Dialogue (FID)

Therefore, the Forum for Intercultural Dialogue (FID) has become concerned with this issue to contribute to building a pluralistic democratic community based on the values of citizenship and human rights—a community that respects diversity and accepts differences, where all people are equal before the law. The Forum's various programs have continued to disseminate the culture of dialogue and empower groups working in the field of culture, particularly young people working for cultural, religious, media, academic institutions, and civil society organizations. FID works to empower these groups to play an active role in cooperating with government and non-government organizations and institutions at the local, regional, and international levels.


First: Capacity Building Programs



These programs seek to build the capacities of young religious leaders, academic, media, innovators, or civil society institutions, as well as university students to become agents of change in combating extremism and supporting values of dialogue and social coherence.

I-Young Leaders Programs

Religious Leaders Program



The program continued to foster interaction between participants to emphasize support of the values of citizenship and positive co-existence among the group members in each of the program's working areas. The program conducted discussions that addressed extremism, terrorism, and the social responsibility of religious leaders in reducing violence. The leaders were given opportunities to prepare papers on different topics to be discussed 18 events were conducted, 969 religious leaders participated in these events. From there 12 community initiatives were implemented benefitting 1,146 citizens in local communities.

One of the implemented initiatives was entitled "Ambassadors of Peace in Egypt, Nubia-Aswan." After the disturbances and problems Nubia has been facing, FID participants decided to implement an initiative to encourage the community to adopt values o community peace through training 30 children in disseminating peace, tolerance, and citizenship in the land of Nubia. The undersecretary of the Ministry of Youth and Sports and a number of local leaders attended the initiative.

Young Academics Program

This program empowers young academics and teachers to become more active in disseminating values of dialogue and tolerance in their educational institutions. Through 12 workshops and a conference that addressed the impact of educational environments in reinforcing co-existence, facing violence in educational institutions, citizenship, and human rights, the program worked with 519 participants. Additionally, local initiatives were implemented to support these values through educational institutions.



Media Professionals Program



This program empowers young media professionals from different media outlets issues, and being able to produce media that reinforces and supports cultural discourse.

The program has worked with 265 young media professionals in the governorates of Cairo, Alexandria, Minia, Assuit, Sohag, Luxor, and Aswan. The program conducted 12 workshops and conferences that focused on media skills related to citizenship, freedom, and the media's social responsibility in facing violence and

University Students Program


This program raises university students' awareness of the values of dialogue and empowers them to become agents of change in their local communities. 30 various activities were conducted in partnership with Assuit University's Center for Future Studies and the University of Minia. 1,282 students participated in workshops, seminars, and camps. These various activities addressed citizenship, equality, justice, volunteerism, democracy, co-existence, and social responsibility.


The most important results include engaging with student unions and affiliated committees, reinforcing student participation and sense of belonging at their educational institutions, and unleashing creativity in young people. Artworks such as poetry, songs, and plays displayed this creativity in a way that demonstrated the values the program addressed.

The students also implemented four community initiatives. A group of Cairo University students who were members of the forum implemented one of the programs "Means of Communication and Community Participation" to introduce 2,000 students to the value of community participation through social media and flyers.

2- CBOs Program



This program empowers community based organizations and provides them with technical assistance and capacity building to be able to manage cultural development programs, in order to promote values of co-existence, democratic transformation, and poor citizens' socioeconomic rights. The following was achieved:

- Working with 8 NGOs concerned with cultural development in the Minia, Assuit, Aswan, and Cairo.
- Expanding geographically by working in new governorates, including Luxor and Alexandria.
- Partnering with organizations that have objectives consistent with those of the program, such as different branches of the Egyptian Family House, cultural centers, and youth centers in different governorates.
- This program's impact came fruitful in the partnering NGOs representatives' capacity in applying the model of sustainable cultural development and communicating with more than 4,000 citizens in the local communities to disseminate the culture of dialogue and achieve change in positive co-existence between Egyptian citizens.

Second: Advocacy **Programs**



Advocacy programs engage policy makers, intellectuals, and opinion makers to contribute to building a democratic society and addressing current issues, in order to support values of pluralism and tolerance in the Egyptian society.

Third: Regional and International **Partnership Programs**



These programs seeks to promote partnership and solidarity on joint issues at regional and international levels, through supporting alliances and exchanging experience for developing cultural interaction based on mutual trust. Five international dialogues were conducted with various partners and participants representing a variety of countries.

Opinion and Policy Makers Program

FID continued to engage with opinion and policy makers from different fields in dialogues concerning pressing national issues and solidifying related opinions and concepts in documents for publication. These documents were submitted to concerned policy makers and institutions to influence public policy for the benefit of citizens. These issues include:




Agricultural marketing



The study included exploring the characteristics of each governorate: their areas, cultivated crops, marketing problems, production requirements, needed and available services, private sector companies, cooperation and partnership mechanisms, as well as benefits and opportunities offered to small farmers
- Prepared a marketing map illustrating marketable crops.
- Conducted an advisory

- meeting to find new investment opportunities in current and future agricultural projects to increase farmers' incomes by providing opportunities and resources to connect them to markets. Participants included 30 representatives of private companies, research centers, and consultants
- Conducted a meeting with 30 farmers from Al Brinsat and its neighboring areas to determine the types of cultivated crops, marketing mechanisms, and services they lack.
- Conducted 25 seminars and events with private sector companies in which 1,000

- farmers participated.
- Signed three marketing contracts between the cooperatives and private sector companies for different crops accounting for 90 acres of farmland and 112 farmers.
- Signed eight contracts with agricultural supply companies for providing seeds, fertilizers, and pesticides for 9.581 farmers.

Horus Hospital seeks to continuously improve the quality of its health-care services to serve citizens and communities. To this end, Horus Hospital focuses on building trust with citizens, accounting for patients' rights, guaranteeing patient satisfaction, and remaining committed to safety measures.

- Contracting with 52 NGOs and medical institutions to reach poor and marginalized Egyptians in more geographical areas.
- Training nurses to obtain technical nursing certificates through training courses in partnership with the Red Crescent and the Directorate of Manpower.
- Opening a dental clinic.
- Using an OCT, one of the most important devices for diagnosing retina and optical nerve conditions.
- Adding an operation room including modern equipment
- Expanding work in Sohag by renting a space for Horus Clinic in partnership with Vodafone Egypt Foundation for Community Development, to examine schoolchildren in Sohag as part of the project "Knowledge is Power"



Urban Environment Development Project of the West District of Minia City

The Project for the Urban Environment Development of the West District of Minia City continued to provide its services to the approximately 165,000 residents of the neighborhood. Despite the economic hardships, the project continued its relentless efforts to preserve the success that has been accomplished. The project continued to:



- Collect solid waste daily from main streets, side streets, and public squares and dispose it in the central dump managed by the governorate's Local Unit. This service covered a population of 165,000 who are the residents of the West District of Minia City.
- Perform equipment maintenance periodically
- Perform quality control checks continuously and submit periodic reports to address issues that arise.
- Remove construction waste using District Local Unit equipment.
- Provide occupational healthcare services to the workers by:
- Providing Hepatitis C screenings and treatment when necessary for 62 workers, in cooperation with the Faculty of Medicine at Minia University.
- Conducting eye examinations, in coordination with Horus Hospital, for 150 workers through eye-care convoys. I I workers received eyeglasses.
- Develop and clean the campus of Kafr El Mansoura School and the area surrounding Minia Industrial School for Girls in cooperation with Minia Directorate of Education and the Muslim Families Organization.
