Unit programs are designed to work in synergy with national approaches included in Egypt vision 2030.

## Eye Care Program

## Major Achievements

- 1- Geographical expansion in implementing the eye care program to reach to 35 poor areas within 6 governorates which are deprived of eye care services. This includes the availability of mobile units affiliated to CEOSS to conduct examinations and refer detected discovered cases for necessary interventions.
- 2- Launching «For the Eyes of Our Children» initiative in partnership with Ministry of Social Solidarity which targeted 10,000 poor, vulnerable and children at risk in order to combat possible preventable blindness causes within the framework of “2018: year of persons with disabilities”. The initiative was implemented by mobilizing community resources at governmental institutions, community based organizations and businessmen.
- 3- Continuation of CEOSS's partnership with the Ministry of Health and Population in providing support for specialized medical convoys implemented by the Ministry for eye diseases treatment at national level as part of the medical services package provided for the most needy citizens. This was implemented within the framework of adopting and activating the national strategy for population.

## Major Achievements

- 1- CEOSS has been granted the membership of the African Community Rehabilitation Network Steering Committee for the North African Seat. This is considered the largest African group of associations working in the area of disability.
- 2- CEOSS signed a cooperation protocol with the Ministry of Social Solidarity aiming at joint action towards enhancing the access of persons with disabilities to their rights in many areas.
- 3- Launching the activities of Sohag initiative: "Sohag friendly for the disabled", in partnership with Sohag Governorate, the National Council for Women and a number of parliamentarians from the governorate towards making all public institutions accessible for persons with disabilities.
- 4- Due to CEOSS' experience in this field, the Ministry of Social Solidarity has assigned CEOSS to study 65 rehabilitation offices in order to prepare them for accessibility implementation.
- 5- Building the capacity of 17 media professionals on the development of the concept of disability and the inclusive society. This has changed the attitudes of the media professionals towards the issues of persons with disabilities to take the perspective of citizenship and rights rather than the compassion perspective. The media professionals also addressed the correct concept of disability in 11 health articles in 8 media institutions.



## Health Program



## Major Achievements

- 1- Adopting the advocacy issue of early detection of breast cancer for Women in partnership with the National Women Health Program. In this context, a meeting was organized by Minister of Health and Population entitled «Better Policies for Breast Tumors Prevention». A number of decision-makers and supporters of different entities participated in this meeting such as the National Council for Women, National Cancer Institute, Egyptian universities, private sector, media, civil society organizations, and Parliamentarians.
- 2- This meeting resulted in establishing a national committee to analyze the current situation and develop a plan with the participation of various parties in order to raise awareness of entire community on breast cancer and the importance of early detection of tumors; and to assist the community to get rid of the wrong social and psychological conceptions about breast cancer.

## Major Achievements

- 1- Selected CEOSS as a consultant to Food and Agriculture Organization «FAO» as a result of its accumulated experience in agricultural programs where CEOSS has built capacity of 180 of 18 agricultural cooperatives in 9 governorates to enhance their knowledge and skills related to management of agricultural cooperatives, providing cooperative services, supplying agricultural inputs and cooperative marketing. Additionally, 4 cooperative associations were empowered in 4 governorates in technical studies and economic feasibility to implement projects in cooperation with the private sector and other associations based on amendments of the cooperatives law No. 2014/204.
- 2- Established two climate change monitoring stations to support small farmers with the correct recommendations that enable them to take necessary precautions to minimize the impact of climate changes on crops.
- 3- Registered an agricultural cooperative in Qalyoubia under the number 234, January 2018. It aimed towards empowering small farmers for affordable funds for agriculture and breeding animals.
- 4- Held a conference on Economic and Social Empowerment of Rural Women. The conference presented the experiences of agricultural programs directed towards the empowerment of rural women. 124 representatives of governmental institutions, CBOs, media professionals, consultants, farmers' males and females participated in this conference.

## Major Achievements

- 1- Signed 192 new contractual partnerships with civil society organizations, elected committees and governmental institutions to implement new development projects.
- 2- Signed 26 cooperation protocols with governmental institutions, civil society organizations and some colleges in Egyptian universities to provide all the available resources to support marginalized citizens in the regions.
- 3- Enhanced citizens' abilities towards accountability and transparency through holding public sessions in which all types of citizens including their elected committees participated in the presence of government officials and decision-makers to hear their demands and rights in order to improve public services and discuss their various issues.

## Economic Development Program

## Major Achievements

1- Held a youth employment fair that aimed at linking youth with the available job opportunities at the private sector companies. 160 young males and females participated in this fair with the presence of 26 companies. In the same context, cooperation and partnership took place with 106 companies and factories to recruit young people during this year.

2- In response to the initiative of the President to provide insurance coverage for vulnerable groups, 3,286 safety certificate were extracted for ladies who are outside insurance coverage to ensure stability of their families in case of death. This was conducted in cooperation with the Egyptian Agricultural Bank and the National Council for Women.

3- Launched the «Your Dream in Your Hand» competition that stimulated young businesswomen who were enrolled into vocational training. Winners were awarded tools and equipment that enable them to start small projects in the scope of the trainings they have received.

It is an approach and a methodology to implement social and economic development that enable economic activists of the most needy groups, especially women, youth and people with disabilities to acquire the means of production and other tools that help them and their families to build capital that contributes in improving their economic situation positively and hence their living conditions.

## Major Achievements

### International Dialogue Program

**Egyptian-American dialogue** aims at enhancing the understanding between Egypt and the United States of America and linking bridges for joint dialogue between the active American members of Congress, representatives of the Egyptian parliament, and some leaders from various governmental entities and civil society partners. 30 participants attended a meeting that tackled the Egyptian situation towards the regional issues, especially in the Middle East and the popular role of parliaments and diplomacy in spreading world peace and the values and principles of heavenly ethics and disseminating them worldwide. Egypt's political and economic reform steps were reviewed to build modern civil state as well as the role of the Parliament in conducting legislative steps aimed at increasing and attracting foreign investments. The American delegation praised the importance of the meeting in presenting the reality in combating media misinformation and also praised the economic reforms taken by Egypt and the positive achievements.

**Arab-European Dialogue** A meeting entitled «Gender, Religion and Contemporary Challenges of Society and Democracy» was held in Sweden in partnership with the Swedish Sigtuna Foundation aiming to deepen mutual understanding, exchanging experiences and presenting a diverse picture of what is happening in the Arab societies far from media's superficial broadcasts. It tackled controversial issues related to the role of religion in contemporary life in light of the challenges of democratic transformations in our societies. The meeting dealt with the relationship between religion and society as the key to understand the situation of any country since it is the basis in the theories of social and political changes. The meeting was attended by 65 intellectuals and representatives of the Egyptian parliament, university professors and media professionals from Egypt, Lebanon, Jordan, Tunisia, and Saudi Arabia from the Arab region; Germany, Sweden and Switzerland from the European countries.

### National Dialogue Program

**First:** Spreading the culture of dialogue and values of citizenship in poor and marginalized communities

Through the partnership with civil society organizations, the Forum has continued its cooperation with 10 civil society organizations representing 7 governorates in Upper Egypt, Cairo and Alexandria through designing and implementing community initiatives targeting the poor and marginalized groups culturally, especially young people, women and children



## Forum for Intercultural Dialogue (FID)



In 2008, the Forum for Intercultural Dialogue concentrated on strengthening the dialogue culture, pluralism, diversity, equality and acceptance of the other among the various society segments. It focused on qualifying and building the capacity of community cadres to enable them to convey ideas and exchange experiences whether among individuals or institutions in order to increase the impact in local communities as well as the impact in sensitive issues related to the Egyptian society through applying number of strategies: empowerment, capacity building, partnership and networking and advocacy.

The peace building and crisis management program continued to promote knowledge, skills, beliefs, and values to change ideas that can assist the communities to avoid both explicit and implicit conflicts and violence, as well as to solve crises in a peaceful way at different levels (individual and collective) through educational curriculum that promote the values of tolerance, democracy and good governance.

## Best Impressions

### Eriny Nabil Minia Governorate Attended trauma healing and resilience **training**

#### Healing from a traumatic severe injustice experience

I have been working in a certain place for many years. In this place, I was subjected to a great injustice and at that time I did not have the chance to practice my right in defending myself and the aggressor continued. I was shocked of some people I used to deal with until I attended the training. My feelings changed when

we reviewed a situation that illustrates the circles of violence. In this discussion, I was touched by what was said which changed my attitude and understanding towards these aggressors. From that time, I began to experience peaceful feelings.

#### 1. Religious Leaders in Assuit support Dialogue and Peaceful coexistence within schools.

Through a joint initiative between Forum and the Family House (Biet El Eilah) in Assiut, the capacity of a group of religious leaders has been built in four villages (Drenka, Zawiya, Musha and Tahrir). They established committees to resolve the conflict within their communities as well as to start a dialogue and peace-building program for junior and high school youth in coordination with schools in these villages where Muslim and Christian leaders together pay a regular visits to schools and hold seminars and panel discussions with students and teachers to support the values of dialogue and coexistence within schools.

#### 2. Beni Suef Youth make a difference

Through the implemented initiative with the Association of Egyptians for Development and Social Services in Beni Suef, which aimed to build the capacities of young people, and in accordance with the gained skills, 10 young people were authorized by the Ministry of Youth and Sports, Fund to Combat Addiction and Values and Life Program to be trainers to build the capacity of peers of other young people. "Matloub Mokhreg" play was performed for more than 250 citizens at the Culture Center and the University Theater in Beni Suef.

through various interventions, such as arts, dialogue sessions, experience exchange and trainings, in addition to activating the role of local partners of governmental institutions and committees representing the society.

**Second: Advocacy and the impact on public issues that affect the society**

The Forum conducted a community dialogue on two of the issues that preoccupied public opinion in 2018:

1. Changes in the law governing the civil work, in which the Forum adopted series of meetings attended by more than 150 representatives of civil society organizations from 9 governorates in Upper Egypt to discuss the most important articles that need to be amended in the law. Recommendations and suggestions were sent to the official committee that is founded by the Prime Minister to amend the law.

2. The population issue in Egypt, in which the Forum adopted a platform to discuss this issue from two main perspectives: cultural discourse represented in cultural, educational and media institutional discourse and religious discourse of the official religious institutions; in order to shed light on the issue and to contribute to activating the role of actors including religious leaders, intellectuals and parliamentarians towards issue resolution dimensions and mechanisms.

A number of meetings have been adopted with the aim of establishing a systematic approach for a community dialogue on the dimensions of the issue. An extended conference was held to present the outputs of the meetings and a number of relevant working papers.

The concerned and related parties participated in the cultural, media, educational, religious, academic, civil society and youth fields, as well as official authorities, mainly the Ministry of Health and Population.


**Third: Adopting integrated development models** The development model which was implemented in three communities: Menbal in Minia Governorate, Bayad El Arab in Beni Suef Governorate, Ezbet Khairallah in Cairo Governorate in building the capacities contributed to building the capacities of 3 organizations, 3 community committees in the field of dialogue. This model indicated that dialogue is one of the most important mechanisms to address the negative phenomena such as violence and non-acceptance of the other, as well as to promote social cohesion and understanding the other. This was done by organizing programs and activities involving Muslims and Christians of both genders, as well as initiatives and camps that support the values of coexistence between young people. Training programs for teachers and social workers were organized to become more capable of disseminating the values of dialogue in schools among students in the compulsory education stage. Sessions were held for teachers and social specialists to discuss mechanisms for dealing with crises, community problems, peace building skills and social cohesion.



## Major Initiatives

## The Arabic Contemporary Commentary Bible (ACCB) – A model of unity that celebrates diversity

A huge milestone was reached on the 15<sup>th</sup> of October, 2018 when the Arabic Contemporary Commentary Bible (ACCB) was launched in Cairo. This one-volume commentary on the whole Bible is a DET project, which began over ten years ago with the partnership and the assistance of Langham Literature UK.



It is the first of its kind: a commentary on the whole Bible, written by 48 Arab theologians, for Arabic-speaking churches in the Middle East and North Africa. The writers come from six Arab countries: Egypt, Lebanon, Jordan, Palestine, Syria and Kuwait, making the project unique in its diversity. This is the first project to bring together Arab Orthodox, Catholic, and evangelical biblical scholars - an important step toward Christian unity.

The commentary also contains 106 articles on contemporary issues facing the ordinary Arab citizens, including scientific, economic, political and religious topics. It is a “landmark in the history of the church in the region” that will help readers biblically address issues facing the region, like Arab Christians and citizenship, secularism and pluralism.



## Major Achievements

- 1- In collaboration with the Investment and projects Development Unit in CEOSS and a consultant, Itsa Wood managed to enter into a typical -6 bedroom production line and practical sets, designed by the technical office in the unit which suit with the local market.
- 2- Continuing the cooperation with Derayah University in New Menia. In light of the market competition, Itsa Wood signed a contract to supply more than 86 student accommodation rooms.
- 3- Continued its support to the local churches through the provision of advanced wooden benches in which 179 benches were supplied for 4 churches.

- 1- Expanding the work scope through increasing the number of partners. 58 different NGOs, health care companies and religious institutions have been contracted to reach the poor and the neediest people.
- 2- Within the framework of linking the hospital with the medical services providers, providing the best services to the patients and responding to customer inquiries, the hospital organized the training workshop sponsored by Johnson & Johnson and Ultra Vision Medical Supplies Company for doctors, nurses and hospital receptionists.
- 3- Within the framework of Minia Governorate celebration of National Day on March 18th, partnership with the General Library of Egypt was held in the presence of the governor and the Manager of Horus Hospital and it was agreed to organize a medical convoy. The results were examining 97 medical cases.
- 4- For the first time in Minia governorate, interventions were carried out for retinal detachments through the hospital other than the university hospitals. Sixteen patients benefited from these interventions with the help of Horus medical team.
- 5- In the framework of community service and access to poor and remote areas, and in partnership with some civil society institutions, 381 cataract operations were conducted to serve the poor and the marginalized.

# Agricultural Projects




The Agricultural Projects Unit includes **three projects**

## **First: Ismailia Farm**

The farm is located on the desert road of Egypt Ismailia on an area of 135 acres planted with fruit crops from wild palms, buckthorn and some field crops of barley and beans. The suitable crops for the nature of soil and water in the region are being tested, such as quinoa and chia.

This is in order to maximize the return of the CEOSS' resources that serve the community.





## **Second: Al-Brinsat Farm**

Al-Brinasat Farm is located in Minia. It is 24 acres of agricultural land cultivated by traditional crops of soybeans, vegetable crops and economic crops.

During the year:

- 1- Restored the infrastructure of the farm through covered networks and changes in the irrigation system.
- 2- Utilization of a part of the area for educational models to increase the income of farmers.
- 3- The cultivation of models using drip irrigation to provide water and in line with the strategy of the State for the optimum use of water.
- 4- Cultivation of non-traditional crops such as avocados with palm to make the most of the area and keep up with the international and domestic market.


