- 1. Improving access of persons with disabilities to specialized rehabilitation services through applying the CBR program in (10) communities in five governorates, targeting 2000 persons with disabilities. This included providing various medical services, establishing and developing (2) rehabilitation units for children with mental disabilities, in addition to mainstreaming females with disabilities to join the labor market, through providing coaching and technical support, as well as enabling them to implement small projects in order to enhance their income, besides getting vocational training.
- 2. Physical adaptation of numerous service institutions in order to be accessible and inclusive of people with disabilities, including constructional and informational accessibility, availing resource rooms and providing them with tools for a number of schools, as well as constructional accessibility for post offices, youth centers, plus providing easy reading boards for people with mental disabilities and learning difficulties, besides issuing integrated service cards for them.
- 3. Building the institutional capacity of disabled persons organizations (DPOs), public service providers, persons with disabilities and their families regarding the concepts of disability and mechanisms for implementing inclusive development, human rights approach, law of persons with disabilities and rules of procedure thereof, in addition to training families on skills of proper engagement with persons with mental disabilities and work rights, as well as organizing a training workshop for members of the Egyptian Forum for People with Disabilities on the concept of gender.
- 4. The program adopted during this year the use of media and art of awareness rising, in addition to simplifying concepts and designing tools through easy read methods in order to facilitate the participation of persons with mental disabilities. This included the production of (4) manuals and a poster aiming to simplify integrated services card management via easy reading.
- 5. The program established a number of active partnerships during this year, including partnership with Al-Nour Center for Eye Treatment, which made an advanced checkup for 87 persons with mental disabilities, in addition to partnership with youth centers for children and persons with disabilities in an attempt to mainstream them in their activities and many of whom have excelled. This is besides supporting partnerships between a number of associations and the private sector, which resulted in obtaining some tools, such as a sensory integration room and other resources.





- 1. The program has continued to apply mechanisms and strategic interventions in order to realize its objectives, most important of which are: Instilling knowledge, providing information on integrated environmental concepts, applying accessibility standards, and implementing technical specifications for implemented works in accordance with the Egyptian code standards in the construction accessibility for buildings, facilities and public institutions. This aims to facilitate the access of persons with disabilities to the services provided, as well as empowering those persons to obtain their rights to free movement, independent living and integration in the community, through providing mobility assistive devices, including prosthetic devices, wheelchairs and crutches. This is in addition to providing a mobile maintenance unit for the maintenance and repairing of devices and mobility assistive devices inside poor areas, in partnership with numerous NGOs and places of worship.
- 2. Within the framework of the Ministry of Social Solidarity's delegation for CEOSS to assume the task of physical adaptation of offices affiliated to the Ministry in order to be integrated and further facilitate the access of persons with disabilities to its services, CSOSS has executed a spatial provision study during this year for 65 rehabilitation offices in (6) governorates, namely: Cairo, Giza, Minia, Marsa Matrouh, Qalioubiya, Kafr Al-Sheikh. Also, accessibility works for 13 rehabilitation offices have been accomplished in Cairo governorate as a first phase. Metal works and other installations have been executed at "Erada" factory in Al-Obour area.

Program: Eyes' Health



Most significant milestones

- 1. The program was directed towards implementing a number of mechanisms and strategic interventions in an aim to bring about its objectives, most importantly are detection and early intervention, human resource development, enhancing and activating policies and national plans relevant to eyes' health in partnership with authorities and specialized ministries, in addition to abiding by the comprehensive eye care health approach.
- 2. Advocacy and gaining support to influence the activation of supportive policies and procedures in eyes' health services in Minia governorate. This resulted in the increase of ophthalmic medicine in (4) health units, in addition to issuing and applying a number of procedures in an attempt to limit contamination that impacts eyes' health in the four communities, which included applying an integrated approach for wastes' collection, in addition to raising environmental awareness of school children in these communities.

My name is Salah Ayad Nakhleh, 55 years old, from Al-Amoudean village, Samalout – Minia Governorate. I am working as Farmer. I didn't know that I had Cataract, but I was always feeling that I didn't see well, but I neglected the problem, as I did not have enough income.

The problem started to increase, and affected my work, and I was requesting my family to help me. By that time, I heard from the villagers that the Hope Association in collaboration with CEOSS are organizing eye convoys. I went to one of these convoys, as the rate is convenient with my income. The physician informed me that I have Cataract in my two eyes, and I had the operation done in the Horus Hospital. I'm feeling better now as my vision is better than before. Currently I am able to work in the land as before.



Health program



Most significant milestones

- 1. The program adopted the application of a number of strategic mechanisms and interventions in order to achieve the most significant objectives, as follows:
- Building institutional capacity for partners from NGOs, community committees and local volunteer leaders.
- Enhancing the level of primary health care in order to provide high quality services, and during this year, (9) health units have been developed and 231 medical and administrative cadres from public health institutions have been trained.
- Activating a referral system to relevant concerned bodies, such as the National Cancer Institute in Minia Governorate, health centers of Shebin al-Qanater, life laboratories affiliated to the Ministry of Health, in addition to referring to health units and medical centers in the work communities.
- 2. Partnering with state agencies in implementing many national initiatives, the most important of which are:
- Participation in the Egyptian Women's Health Initiative related to the examination and detection of breast tumors through participating in providing consultation to women and referring targeted women to care centers that provide examination and detection services at the level of governorates targeted with this work (Cairo, Qalioubiya, Beni Suef, Menya).
- Participation in the National Initiative to Eradicate Virus C, where CEOSS participated, in cooperation with its local partners, in implementing activities to educate citizens and receive citizens inside the headquarters of partner associations in order to conduct examinations and follow up on referring cases that have been detected.
- -Signing (3) cooperation protocols with health directorates and life laboratories affiliated to the Ministry of Health at the level of governorates of work aimed at activating the referral system among the different levels to provide and avail health care continuously at an affordable cost.

"Children at Risk" program



- 1. Capacity building of (877) cadres in partner organizations and governmental institutions on concepts, policies and mechanisms of child protection, child law, accountability and transparency, partnership strategy and implementation mechanisms.
- 2. Building the capacities of (20) child protection committees in Minia and Qalioubiya governorates as regards the concepts of child protection, the roles and responsibilities of child protection committees, the concept and goals of case management system. The members of the protection units were also empowered to establish integrated administrative and technical work mechanisms, in addition to supporting (9) sub-committees in the centers and a general committee with computers and their component to facilitate the work of committees in preparing and entering all databases.
- 3. Training (375) of community education schools' teachers in nine centers in Minia Governorate in cooperation with the Directorate of Education to acquire knowledge and skills for effective learning methods, including topics of modern teaching strategies, skills of using educational aids, in addition to "No child labor" program.
- 4. Activating the role of (5) health units by improving the services they provide via providing some medical devices, as well as training doctors, nurses and rural pioneers on quality management and standards.
- 5. Holding a seminar on "The role of media in protecting children" in partnership with the World Food Program (WFP) and the National Council for Childhood and Motherhood, in which 20 media professionals, journalists, and representatives of government and civil society institutions partici-

The workshop discussed the rights of the child and the concept of child protection, as well as urgent children's issues from the perspective of legislative and international conventions, laws that protect their rights in the field of work and studying, as well as the standards of press and media publishing on children's issues. The meeting resulted in a number of significant recommendations, including the necessity of supporting the media in order to propose and activate laws of child protection against exploitation, the importance of adopting campaigns by the media for mobilization and raising awareness regarding issues of children at risk, in addition to activating child protection policies and mechanisms by the National Council for Childhood and Motherhood, and this meeting has resulted in the dissemination of many topics concerning this issue in the media.

6. Holding a panel discussion on the street children phenomenon; the current situation and future work mechanisms with the participation of many agencies working with children, such as WFP, Caritas Egypt, child protection committees, child rights coalition, representatives of the Ministry of Social Solidarity and media. The discussions have resulted in coming up with a set of recommendations identifying the best mechanisms and means of dealing with this phenomenon, as well as the role of partners in supporting this issue.

Housing program

- Qualifying and training 37 community cadres to support poor families to get a healthy and environment-friendly housing.
- The program has managed to develop partnership with Sisco Global, which is a private sector company that had participated in a labor camp, within the framework of its social responsibility, for implementing houses' development works at Al-Amodein community, with the participation of other community volunteer groups.

Within the framework of CEOSS interest in the economic empowerment of women, a project to improve the living conditions of women heading households in poor rural and urban areas and working in the informal sector in Egypt has been implemented in (30) rural and urban communities in Cairo, Giza, Qalyubia, Beni Sueif and Minia. The project has contributed to empowering and enhancing women's skill capabilities to increase the rate of their integration in the formal sector, besides securing a higher income level for them and improving their access to services and rights.

My name is Entesar Saber, I am 37 years old, I have a poliomyelitis disability and I live with my mother, father and siblings. I had no source of income and we were poor. My father is a poor farmer and we had no fixed income. I couldn't find a job because of my disability, which made me very depressed because all workplaces rejected me as a result of my disability. I heard of a resource center for entrepreneurship that offers help and training. I felt happy when I went there, and I met the center manager. I applied for training and was accepted. It happened and I got trained. I needed to issue work documents, such as labor office notice, social security number, criminal record certificate, qualification certificate. Then, I was trained at Delta factory and afterwards I worked on a sewing machine for EGP 1000. Later, I was health and socially insured. And now, my salary amounts to almost EGP 2000, including the incentives and remunerations. My life had changed. I can help myself and get all my needs and I also help my parents. My mood has changed, and I am feeling good after I worked.

Most significant milestones

- 1. Establishing (30) resource and entrepreneurship centers at project work communities to provide guidance, as well as technical and legal support for women, in addition to helping them find opportunities to join the labor market and integrate in the formal sector. Also, 21 social and economic units have been established, operated and managed by women in work communities.
- 2. Building the capacities of (281) members of CBOs and elected committees as regards the right-based development approach.
- 3. Conducting partnerships with several state institutions, which had provided its resources for the benefit of women working in the informal sector, like labor force directorates, health, Social Solidarity, Insurance and Pensions Authority, MSMEs Development Authority, in addition to partnership with the private sector (such as Eagle East factory in Beni Sueif, Fabulous factory for ready-made garments in Bani Sueif, Delta factory for ready-made garments in Minia, Al-Raei factory for halva in Minia, Misr Al-Kheir for ready-made garments in Minia, Al-Zaafrana for clothing in Cairo, Al-Fath company for clothing in Cairo, M.Y.A Company for Medical Services, C.H.F for Consultation and Training, and medical centers).
- 5. The project has managed to submit to the Egyptian Parliament a draft law on protecting women working at homes as a result of the advocacy campaign held under the slogan of (We want a law that protects us). The results of this campaign included awareness with the cause, holding panel discussions and community dialogue meetings with the participation of several active parties, most significantly are members of the Representatives' Council, civil society organization (CSOs) representatives, elected women committees, authorities concerned with the cause, as well as several media authorities.

Most significant milestones

- 1. The program applied several strategic mechanisms and interventions in an aim to realize its objectives, as follows:
- Organizing small farmers and breeders in groups, associations and entities that practice democracy in choosing who represents them before private sector companies and government authorities that demand their rights and defend their interests.
- Applying good agricultural models that depend on the application of good agricultural practices as well as the value-added approach, resulting in the increase of productivity, reduction of production costs, improvement of production quality and marketing of products to more profitable markets, which is in turn reflected on the increase of income.
- Conserving natural resources, decreasing the use of chemical fertilizers, producing and using organic fertilizers (compost) from agricultural wastes.
- Developing the mechanisms used in agricultural extension for small farmers through applying the idea of field schools, where technical support and awareness are provided for farmers via using educational curricula and specialized guiding manuals by those who are specialists in this field. In this context, 29 field schools were organized at Minia governorate work communities for raising awareness and disseminating good agricultural practices for (6) cultivated crops (garlic, potatoes, wheat, corn, soy beans, coriander, marjoram). Also, 30 field schools have been organized at Fayoum governorate with the objective of raising awareness regarding means of producing organic fertilizers (compost) from agricultural wastes.
- Economic empowerment of women farmers through enabling

- them to manage small agricultural projects that generate income and contribute to bringing about food security.
- Applying advocacy mechanisms and procedures as well as gaining support to influence decision makers regarding the adoption of irrigation water scarcity issue at working communities at Youssef Al-Sedeek city in Fayoum via conducting meetings for farmers and their elected committees with senior officials at the Ministry of Irrigation. As a result, the senior officials responded via finding suitable solutions for farmers.
- 2. Establishing partnerships with various governmental institutions had included the following:
- Partnership with the agriculture directorate in Minia for building capacities of 35 agricultural extension engineers at the governorate with the aim of providing them with knowledge and modern technical skills that qualify them to offer technical support to farmers in field schools.
- Partnership with the Agricultural Directorate in Favoum for capacity building of agricultural engineers as regards organic fertilizers' production skills. As a result, small male/female farmers had awareness' rising sessions in 30 field schools on means of producing organic fertilizers from agricultural wastes. The directorate also participated in qualifying community cadres to produce compost models, in addition to the dissemination and exchange of information.
- Partnership with Veterinary Directorates at the governorates of work in order to provide veterinary convoy services for livestock breeders, in addition to technical supervision of implementingsmall projects relevant to livestock and poultry production that is managed by women.

Gender Program

- Raising the awareness of 1977 citizens in poor communities regarding concepts related to equality, discrimination and gender-based violence.
- Building the capacities of (431) of CSOs members, elected committees and community cadres on gender balance and the skills required for supporting the causes of women and girls.
- Launching (We are made complete through you) campaign that targeted raising awareness of women on their rights and the challenges they are facing in the Egyptian community, in partnership with the National Council for Women, the Regional Federation for Associations in Giza, the Ministry of Social Affairs and the Ministry of Religious Endowments (Waqfs) in Greater Cairo.
- Organizing an awareness campaign under the title of (No Violence against Women) in cooperation with Elimination of Violence against Women Unit at Minia Governorate. It targeted highlighting the problems to which women are subject through artistic works and theatre plays.
- Organizing several events to celebrate the International Women's Day, such as organizing "Face to Face" campaign in Qalioubiya, which targeted raising awareness on women's

- rights and the elimination of violence against them. It targeted 1200 youth and men working at health units.
- Building the capabilities of (22) Islamic and Christian clerics and community leaders regarding women's issues and their role in adopting an influential religious discourse that urges society to enhance the stance of women and combat all forms of violence against them.
- Training (15) of media professionals on the role of media in combating violence against women. The training tackled means of drafting news and conveying the image via audio and visual media in an aim to raise community awareness on these issues.
- Forming groups of (52) community and youth cadres within Greater Cairo to work on women's issues, violence against women and means of facing some situations where women are subject to inequality within the labor and gender-based violence communities.
- Empowering (20) women economically through providing them with job opportunities via setting up small projects for them in Giza Governorate, in cooperation with the Free Arab Generation Foundation.



Most important models of partnerships: Partnership with the Well Spring Foundation in implementing a psychological rehabilitation program for returners from Libya and their families that targeted enhancing their capabilities, and further supporting them to cope and recover from the pressures arising from their exposure to economic and social crises.

- 1. The mechanisms of the institutional support program have been developed to implement Coaching and Mentorship Mechanisms through using Central Incubators specialized in developing plans and curricula for building resilience and community flexibility, developing training and orientation plans, developing training manuals and materials, curricula and branch incubators that are chosen from NGOs at the governorate level to host the branch incubator, which will be responsible for training, and providing training courses for local CSOs on developing capacities to build flexibility and community resilience through local mentors. Those mentors shall train and follow up smaller local CSOs at all stages of capacity building, selection and design of local initiatives, implementation and management of sub-grants, in the context of social and economic resilience.
- 2. The capacities of CSOs and committees elected by citizens have been built around a number of main topics that included community resilience and flexibility, local initiatives' planning, implementation and management using methods of partnership, as well as planning and executing advocacy and lobbying campaigns, negotiation and accountability skills, strategic planning skills and social protection mechanisms.
- 3. Building the institutional capabilities of governmental institutions' officials to become more supportive and responsive to guaranteeing citizens' rights, as they were trained on various topics that included rights-based development, employee performance development, and communication skills to improve service delivery performance for citizens.

Presidential Initiatives

"The Light of Life (Nour Al Hayat)" Initiative

- CEOSS' partnership in the Presidential Initiative (Nour Al Hayat) continued in coordination and cooperation with the Viva Egypt (Tahya Misr) Fund, and the initiative aims to combat the causes of poor sight and vision loss, for the elderly and the students in primary schools. Where work was done in a 8 regions and cities in the governorates of Minia, Beni Sueif and Qaliubiya and 50 primary schools, many successes were realized through this initiative, the most important of which are:
- Conducting a medical survey for (43948) primary school students and elderly persons
- Conducting 700 cataract operations in Beni Sueif Hospital and Menoufia Military Hospital
- Providing 8300 eyeglasses for free
- Partnering with specialized medical centers and pharmaceutical companies to make available medicines and surgeries for cases that have been detected and referred from medical convoys. therapy drugs were provided for 1600 cases and 10 surgeries were performed for free.

"Decent Life (Hayat Karima)" Initiative

The Authority participated during this year in the presidential initiative "Decent life (Hayat Karima)" in partnership with the Ministry of Social Solidarity and the National Initiative for the Poorest Villages. The initiative aims to raise the economic, social and environmental level of Egyptians, particularly families in poor villages, and their empowering to obtain all basic services and further maximizing their capability to productive works that contribute to achieving a decent life for them through cooperation with the ministries concerned and in partnership with institutions and NGOs.

Qualitative Milestones

- The activities of the initiative during this period focused on providing basic health services to poor families in the communities of work, which are the priority needs demonstrated by the results of the study carried out by the Ministry of Social Solidarity. Health services included many specialties such as internal medicine, pediatric, ophthalmology, reproductive health services, dentistry, surgeries and medical analyses in addition to providing therapy drugs.
- Many institutions concerned at Al-Behera Governorate participated with a major role in mobilizing their resources and employing them for the benefit of poor citizens in the targeted communities to maximize impact, as well as participating actively at all stages of planning, implementation and follow-up of all interventions. Among these agencies were the Directorate of Social Solidarity and the National Initiative for the Poorest Villages, Al-Behera governorate, the Ministry of Health and health directorate of governorate councils besides local units to which these poor targeted communities are affiliated.

In coordination with the State efforts in national initiatives, the unit has participated during this year in the implementation of (2) Presidential initiatives, namely "The Light of Life (Nour Al Hayat)" and "Decent Life (Hayat Karima)" initiatives in poor working communities, as follows:

Mechanization and Agricultural Equip-

Most significant milestones

Local dialogue program

It aims to build and qualify female youth leaders cadre in accordance with an integrated approach of knowledge relevant to citizenship dialogue and respecting others, as well as negotiation and communication skills, besides managing conflicts via studies for identifying needs of all the groups targeted by the work programs including (programs for youth religious leaders, academics, media professionals, civil society representatives, students from Christian and Islamic religious institutions, in addition to women Islamic preachers and Christian church servants)

Capacity building plans have been designed and implemented according to the actual needs and performance gaps in knowledge and skills. The level of knowledge and skills of participants have been developed, resulting in:

30 religious leaders have taken positive steps towards bringing about change to their communities. They have implemented community activities and initiatives aiming at teaching new ideas regarding citizenship, dialogue enhancement and accepting others to youth, children and women citizens.

The Egyptian-American Dialogue

It aims to open channels for discussing contemporary issues facing the Egyptian and American societies, with the objective of bringing about mutual cooperation for enhancing development efforts within the local reality, as well as exchanging experiences and identifying developmental efforts exerted by Egypt and CEOSS in Upper Egypt and poor areas. This is in addition to presenting the political, economic, social and security developments witnessed by Egypt, besides the efforts and initiatives exerted for changing stereotypes and negative images regarding the Islamic countries in general and Egypt in particular: through organizing a meeting for 51 participants of American research activists, intellectuals, religious leaders, influencers, Egyptian parliament representatives and a number of leaders from various governmental authorities.





The Arab-European Dialogue

During this year, the Arab-European dialogue meeting has been conducted under the title of "Peaceful coexistence...Challenges and Potentials", and it comprised a number of themes, such as the contemporary challenges for peaceful coexistence, media, stereotypes in the public domain, human rights and peaceful coexistence.

Education and religious institutes have a role to play in peaceful coexistence, with participation of 77 intellectuals, parliamentarians, religious leaders and media professionals from the different Arab and European States, as well as representatives from countries such as: Germany, Sweden, Greece, Netherlands, Russia, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Lebanon, Iraq, Palestine, Morocco and Egypt.

has expressed the impact of the program on her, indicating that it provided her with the first opportunity ever to get introduced to and meet other people from a religious background that is different from hers, which was a comprehensive change of all her erroneous concepts about others. She said:

- I am one of the people who totally rejected the idea of dealing with people belonging to a different religion or gender because mixing with the other gender is unacceptable in my culture. However, I had to abide by the program rules of participation.
- All through my life, I was against the idea of mingling with Christians or any people from a religious background that is different from mine. This was very difficult for me, but I thought maybe I can give it a try.
- Again, I rejected the idea of mixing between boys and girls, especially when I went to the CEOSS headquarters.
- But by time, I found that the idea of mingling with people who are different is not an impediment and as days passed during the program, this idea was changing and I started to act normally and share my talent of singing with my colleagues, regardless of their religious belief or gender. They have encouraged me and I wish to present a very special song one day that opens

new horizons of success before me. Power lies in our differences.

Peace Building

The Peace Building and Crisis Management program aims to prepare local leaders, so that they would be capable of reading local reality and promptly interfere to avoid crises, as well as transforming conflicts in a constructive way that seeks to bring about justice and reconciliation via practical means combining between theory and application. This is in addition to enhancing community integration and reducing negative polarization.

In this regard, the peace building work has continued during 2019 through the following programs.

First: Conflict Resolution

Helping the parties of an existing conflict to understand the needs of other parties and to work on finding practical solutions for settling these existing conflicts.

This takes place through a package of skills-relevant training programs for "Effective communication, negotiation, mediation and dialogue skills".

Second: Transforming Conflict

Transforming the relationship of a conflict into a positive relationship through various mechanisms, such as forming reconciliation and fact-revealing committees.

This can be done through training programs on topics like "healing from injuries -building resilience - breaking violence circles - cooperation rather than competition - restorative justice".

Third: Conflict Prevention

Early intervention systems to prevent conflict

Through special training programs "Crisis prediction – leadership skills – planning skills – justice – rule of law – human rights – counseling – critical scientific thinking – collective work – reading local reality"

My name is Asmaa Mahmoud – I have 37 years old and I live in Cairo

I work as a teacher

I learnt through the training program the importance of good listening when dealing with crises. Regarding my role as a mediator between people, personally, I had a big problem before taking the training. My problem lied in my severe nervousness to the extent that I could break anything that lies before my eyes or use violent words. I used to have loud voice and I used to scream. Following the training and after being subject to the topics of peace, self-control and listening, I learnt how to control myself before the different events. I started to be calmer and could control my temper. Even when my son did something wrong one day, my reaction was totally different in comparison to previous similar situations. Since then, my family started to feel the difference and they encouraged me, which made me keen to work on myself. Also, I became able to talk with the people around me at work, or my neighbors about their problems and help them solve them. This is what I learnt in the mediation topic, in addition to the means of solving problems and crises before their aggravation. I want to thank the program very much and I wish to learn more and more.



- For the fourth year in a row, Etsa Wood is till managing to participate in tenders and major operations, for example, it managed to supply wood works to Draya Private University in New Minia. This included furnishing 173 rooms for students.

Training Centers

It seeks to partner with civil society organizations and religious institutions and help them build their capacities, through providing all supporting services for trainings, meetings and seminars, in addition to making a little profit margin to help the organization deliver its message.



1- Itsa Center:

It consists of hotel rooms for accommodation of up to 220 persons, 4 halls of different areas to accommodate different numbers of participants; and are further equipped for all meetings and occasions. The Center also has playgrounds, a camp, swimming pool, restaurant and cafeteria.

2- Al-Dahabiya:

It is a house boat in the middle of Al-Menya Corniche. It has rooms for accommodation, a deck for events, training rooms, a restaurant and cafeteria.

3- Al-Nozha Restaurant:

It is located in Al-Nozha office in Cairo. It is equipped to offer meals during trainings held in the office.

- Equipped Itsa Center to host persons with special needs and the elderly through entrance halls leading to the restaurant, swimming pool, halls and elevator.
- Hosting events in Itsa Center for a number of 1200 of individuals, along with providing all services of meals, accommodation and other services.
- Hosted a 5 days conference for 25 persons from different nationalities worldwide, with all related services (accommodation, meals, etc.).
- 30000 individuals have been hosted in 25 major events.
- About 290 meetings were held at Itsa Center headquarters, with an average number of 35000 individuals from all community groups. Meetings varied between (sports activities-trips-trainings-public meetings).
- 500 trips have been hosted inside the swimming pool area.
- The center offered light meals for 10000 individuals.
- Itsa training center hosted several conferences, as well as local and international meetings, such as (Medics Conference – Vocational training and technical education support and development conference – The Egyptian-African Dialogue Conference – Women Seminar Conference – Drug addicts' Ministry Conference – Cairo Company for Developmental measurements – Coptic Orphans' Conference – Egypt's shepherd Foundation).

The Agricultural Projects Unit aims to maximize the organization's economic return through providing economic services based on competition and quality.
